n 2004, the Vancouver Police Department signed an agreement with the British Columbia Aboriginal Workforce Strategy (BCAWS) and the Province of British Columbia to promote employment and career development opportunities. This lead to the development of the ACP, which is open to anyone of Aboriginal ancestry who would gain from this experience. It is currently funded by ACCESS.
