ACCESS has been granted a one-year extension and will continue to provide employment and training opportunities to urban Aboriginal people until March 2010. The one-year extension will provide a gradual transition toward the renewal strategy and allow for planning of future initiatives.

If you wish to find out more about ACCESS then you can attend the ACCESS Spring community forum on May 14th to be held at the Vancouver Aboriginal Community Centre 1607 East Hastings Street. The forum runs from 11:00 to 3:00 p.m. Clients can peruse the information booths before lunch and speak with the local employers and various community organizations.

The theme of the community forum is "Riding out the Roller Coaster of Employment." ACCESS' goal is to equip clients with survival techniques on how to cope with today's economic ups and downs and how it affects employment.

ACCESS offers customized employment and training services designed specifically to provide members of the Lower Mainland urban Aboriginal community with the education and skills to compete

equally and effectively in today's job market. Building skills specific to the job site is the focus of the Essential skills lab in New Westminster. The Essential Skills lab has increased workplace skills specific to the employer partners within the Aboriginal community. New partnerships have been created including BC Ferries, CN Rail, CP Rail, BC Housing, Safeway and Overwaitea Food Group.

ACCESS Trades Training and Apprenticeships along with BCIT delivered programs such as the Carpentry IP refresher, Plumbing Level 1, and Women in Trades just to mention a few. The BladeRunners program is designed to assist youth-at-risk to receive training and secure jobs in the construction field. ACCESS Trades Training and Apprenticeships

ACCESS Trades, in partnership with VRCA (Vancouver Regional Construction Association), the (ITA) Industry Training Authority and BOB (Building Opportunities for Business) hosted a Women's CORE Program from January 12th to March 6, 2009 at the RONA/VANOC Fabrication Shop. The women attended life skills classes facilitated by Leslie Nelson, financial literacy facilitated by Danielle Levine, and basic carpentry and skills development instucted by James Martin.

Under the guidance of James Martin, the women learned to work with basic hand and power tools.



They completed two projects, a coat rack and a cedar chest that they were allowed to keep. They also built an Asian style kiosk that is currently in use at Lonsdale Quay.

ACCESS Trades provides training and support to apprentices and continues to host numerous trades related programs for Aboriginal people. November 2008 Community Forum

Service Canada's Keith Conn: "ACCESS is there for 2010"

Community forum attendees braced themselves for news regarding changes to client and program funding as a result of the renewal process of the AHRDA's during Keith Conn's speech at the ACCESS community forum on November 27, 2008.

Keith, who is from the Aboriginal Unit Human Resources Skills and Development Canada listed the priorities for the successor strategy, including focus on youth, those with disabilities, mulitiple barriered clients, and Essential Skills.

He exclaimed that while he doesn't have a crystal ball in front of him, that looking at the results and achievements of ACCESS, "it is logical to think ACCESS is there for the future."

This is encouraging news indeed, and we hope that ACCESS will continue to provide services to Aboriginal clients, build partnerships and deliver employment and training programs in the Metro Vancouver area in and beyond 2010.
