The 8-week training program Access to Hospitality was de-

signed for Aboriginal persons embarked on a partnership who would like the opportunity to explore the essential skills reguired for work in the hospitality sector. The course content included lessons that covered the Essential Skills for housekeeping, food and beverage service delivery, front desk work, cashier Guest Check-In Processes, Guest Packages.

> Students job shadowed staff in the areas of Housekeeping and

Front Desk Clerk at two large hotels in Burnaby and New Westminster. They learned about daily routines over a two-day period. Learners then had training with our employer partner DMH Hospitality in Downtown Vancouver at the Vancouver Club.

The learners also obtained current certifications in Serving It Right, First Aid Level 1, Food Safe, WHMIS, and World Host. They're now equipped with upto-date industry related skills for employment and are now actively seeking employment. Out of 24 who completed the Access to Hospitality Program, 12 have secured employment.

BLADERUNNERS CUTS DOWN BARRIERS TO EMPLOYMENT

he construction industry has always appealed to Victoria's Jessica McGregor, who started working as a general labourer. McGregor 21, is part of the BladeRunners program which trains and helps find jobs for people between the ages of 17 and 30 who face barriers to employment. It's been operating in the capital region for 20 years by The John Howard Society.

"My grandfather is a welder and my father is a truck driver. Ever since I was young, I was really attracted to the construction trades," McGregor states.

BUILDING SERVICE WORKER PROGRAM

he Building Service Worker Training Program (BSW) consisted of 4 weeks of classroom instruction including WorkSafe BC Health and Safety Training, Emergency First Aid Level 1 including CPR, WHMIS, Building Service Worker Certificate and FoodSafe certification. When offered, participants had a chance to do a volunteer work placement to hone their new found skills in a real work setting. Out of 63 Participants that went through the BSW Program 38 have confirmed employment.
