he Native Education College Health Care Assistant Program uses a culturally sensitive approach and Aboriginal wellness model to prepare students to provide appropriate assistance to elders, Aboriginal families, and people of various cultures and backgrounds in residential care facilities. The students will receive a clinical practicum and obtain Standard First Aid, CPR Level C, WHMIS and FoodSafe Level 1 Certifications.

Students will receive individualized support and preparation in gaining essential employability skills, job search techniques, resume preparation support, and interview skills workshops to better prepare them after they have successfully completed the HCA program.
